MEET FRIENDS OF BALLARDVALE

The BallardVale Gazette spoke with Karen Herman, Chair of the Preservation Commission in Andover for the first in a series of informal interviews with people around town.

Karen Herman served as President of the Andover Historical Society from 1983-1987, and served on its board for 17 years. She was appointed to Andover's Preservation Commission in 1987 by the Town Manager when her term as AHS president came to an end. She has served a Chair since 1994. She is also an artist and a member of Off Broadway Artists Cooperative in Lawrence.

BG: How did you get interested in preservation?

KH: I've always been interested in history and culture, in material culture. I have a degree in history and a master's degree in Bilingual/ ESL Studies. I'm also an artist. My husband and I have lived in historic homes for a long, long time, and have renovated homes and made them our own while respecting their history. All of those things blend together very well, I think, and led me to preservation.

BG: What are the main responsibilities and activities of the Preservation Commission?

KH: The Commission administers the Demolition Delay By-Law, which allows the imposition of a 12-month delay period, on everything registered on the historic building survey, and the Dimensional Special Permit for Historic Preservation, which allows the subdivision of a lot so that a historic house can be moved to it and preserved. We're excited because the Special Permit is becoming popular. We've approved two this year, with another two or three applications in the works. People are considering it, and it often creates more affordable housing. We also hear in an advisory way all hearings involving exterior architectural

changes for historic structures. We host the annual Preservation Awards, and are currently working to update the historic building survey.

BG: You were appointed in 1987?

KH: Yes. John Sullivan was the Chair at the time. I came on as Secretary, and took over from him when he retired. Much of our time was focused on creating the Demolition Delay By-law, which came into effect in 1991. In 1993-94 we initiated the BallardVale Historic District Study Committee in large part because John Sullivan had a strong love of BallardVale. We thought that of all the historic areas, there was probably the best opportunity to make that happen in BallardVale.

BG: Why is that?

KH: BallardVale is small and it's a community in and of itself. It has a community feeling, and always has. We thought, it has a special quality about it, it's cohesive, and it's threatened by industry, the railroad and the highways...all the things that really encroach on a community that can have a negative impact. And it was largely intact, with a few small exceptions, as it had always been. We started with BallardVale first and Shawsheen Village second because they're at the two extremes of the town and are crisscrossed by major highways. We knew that, of all the neighborhoods in town, these were the places that were the most vulnerable to development, industry and traffic. We wanted to protect the small community feeling which is what is so special about Ballard Vale.

BG: How did the study committee and the community get along?

KH: I was amazed at the way everybody worked together, how people talked to each other, how they got out and organized coffees and informal sessions where people could meet and chat and talk about their fears. There was very constructive debate. Some people were skeptical, but in the end, people said maybe this can work. It passed at Town Meeting with a 2/3

vote, which is hard to get. A bigger number of people believed it could work than didn't. That's special and tells you something important is happening.

BG: The BallardVale Historic District Commission was established to help retain the historic character of BallardVale, architecturally and also in a social way?

KH: It preserves community character, which is much more than just an aesthetic or about retaining charm. Community character is about diversity, it's about age diversity, families, single people... all these different people coming together and living in a reasonably priced, small town-like environment, which is now evaporating across the country.

BG: What advice do you have for the Commission?

KH: Stay flexible and don't be too dogmatic. That can happen in historic districts, like Nantucket, for instance. Keep a flexible approach and be able to grow, change and adapt.

BG: What do you see in BallardVale's future? KH: Of course, who can really say, but transportation pressures and development along 193 will continue to be issues of concern. I think BallardVale will still have to fight off the intensive development pressures, to be able to maintain a small house with a reasonable-sized yard, and resist the lot line-to-lot line houses that overwhelm the landscape. It will be like a breath of fresh air for people to drive or walk through BallardVale and experience a neighborhood built on such a human scale.

With the Commission, you already have a formed group that can advocate for BallardVale. You don't have to reinvent the wheel or regroup to address every new, whether perceived or real, threat.

BG: You clearly are very committed to preservation.

KH: When I was a little girl, 9 or 10 years old, we lived in Denver, Colorado. One day my dad drove my mother and my brother and me into downtown Denver, and he said, "Take one last look because it's all going away". And they literally bulldozed the whole lower part of downtown Denver. They did not stop until someone said, "Hold the horses here", and managed to save only one block of the oldest section of downtown Denver. I will never forget that as long as I live because I saw it with my own eyes. I've always said if I could do anything to save a historic building, I would do it.

TAX CREDIT

On November 26, 2003, Governor Romney signed into law (Section 22 MGL Chapter 141) a state historic preservation tax credit as a component of the \$50 million Economic Stimulus package. The 20% tax credit is targeted to income producing property that is at least 50 years old and is certified historic by the Massachusetts Historical Commission. This 5-year program will make \$10 million available on an annual basis. The credit was proposed by the Massachusetts Preservation Coalition. For more information, visit www.preservationmass.org.
