### BUILDING SOLD...LOCAL BUSINESS MOVES OUT

Former mechanic Joe DeCastro looked for a new opportunity for his family and found it when, in 1997, he purchased the laundry business located in the center of BallardVale on Andover Street. He and his wife, Fatima, turned it into the successful family-owned BallardVale Laundry & Dry Cleaning. Daughters Tania and Lisa have run the shop, while son Rick, who also owns Amesbury Cleaners, is the actual dry cleaner. In January, the building that is home to the BallardVale Laundry & Dry Cleaning was sold and rent for the space increased significantly. After several family meetings, the DeCastros decided to close up their storefront and consolidate the business into their Lowell location.

Although the DeCastros will be working out of their storefront at 1275 Pawtucket Boulevard in Lowell as of March 1, they will continue to serve loyal BallardVale customers with free pick-up and delivery service, and will keep their local phone number. #### WE'VE BEEN ASKED...

What do the AVIS signs in BallardVale refer to?

AVIS is an acronym for the Andover Village Improvement Society. Founded in 1894, its goal was, in part, to preserve Andover's beautiful landscapes. The Feb. 11, 1901 Report of the Secretary of AVIS notes the realization "that the heritage of natural beauty which we have received must, in part, at least be passed on unimpaired." AVIS continues to be a strong and active organization today, working to preserve open spaces, woodlands and wetlands and to maintain trails for public use. It works closely with the Andover Conservation Commission, and currently has 1000 acres of permanent conservation land open for hiking, birding, cross-country skiing and snowshoeing.

BallardVale is fortunate to have several AVIS reservations in its backyard to enjoy. The Anne Rawlins Reservation is 26 acres of land surrounded by Bannister Road, Dascomb Road and Andover Street. It features a high ridge that extends its length and is a continuation of Indian Ridge, a glacial esker. It is a beautiful walk any time of year and is accessible from Bannister Road. The Vale Reservation is connected to the Shawsheen River Reservation, as well as Andover Conservation Commission's Pomps Pond and Foster's Island nature areas. Several trails are available, and walkers will observe a variety of wildlife and plants, including geese, ducks, herons, muskrats and painted turtles. Parking and entrance to the Vale Reservation is located at the end of Dale Street.

The Burns Reservation is a twoproperty. part One parcel. approximately an acre and a quarter in size, is located on the corner of Clark Road and Andover Street, just opposite the fire station, and extends along the north side of Clark Brook; the other larger parcel is located further along Clark Brook off Chester Street. The land was originally given to AVIS in 1989 by Christine (Burns) Forsythe, and was named in memory of her parents. An active person and lover of the outdoors, Mrs. Forsythe was a long-time resident of BallardVale and donated the acres to help preserve open spaces in the neighborhood she loved.

Recently, AVIS purchased two more parcels of land from the owners of 18 and 20 Chester Street, increasing the size of the Burns Reservation, and coming nearer to its goal to eventually connect the two parts of the Burns Reservation along Clark Brook.

Barbara Smith, the daughter of Christine Forsythe, was one of the property owners who sold a portion of the back of her lot, building on her mother's legacy and keeping alive AVIS' original goal that our heritage of natural beauty be passed on unimpaired.
