I can tell the change of seasons in Pole Hill when I see the dogs. It is either spring (mud season), summer (swimming in the Shawsheen River), fall (hunting season, wearing orange collars and vests), or winter (following animal tracks in the snow). Whatever the time of year, it is good to see the dogs and their "hoomens" enjoying Pole Hill. A dog is a very special companion and no matter where you walk, know that your dog loves your company.

Fire Station Dedication

It's official — the ribbon was cut in November and the new Ballardvale Fire Station has been dedicated. The facility is named for the late William T. Downs, longtime Andover fire fighter, former fire chief and Select Board member, and active town volunteer. According to Andover Preservation Commission Chair Karen Herman, many organizations and groups contributed to the design — and completion — of the station project, in addition to the BVHDC and the Commission. Architect Craig Gibson, a member of the Commission, created the design. Staff members from the Fire Department, Facilities, and Town Building Committee, their architects, the town manager, community members, and many others helped to refine the design and move the project forward. The result is impressive and Ballardvale now has a fire station that should serve the community well for many years to come. Plans for the vacant lot next to the fire station are not yet finalized, but they include parking spaces for the playground as well as meetings and events at the station. Design plans for the other side of the station, the intersection of Clark Road and Andover Street, will soon be ready for review by the BVHDC.
